

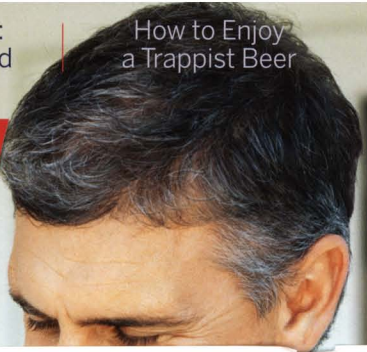

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SANTA FE INTERNATIONAL FOLK ART MARK

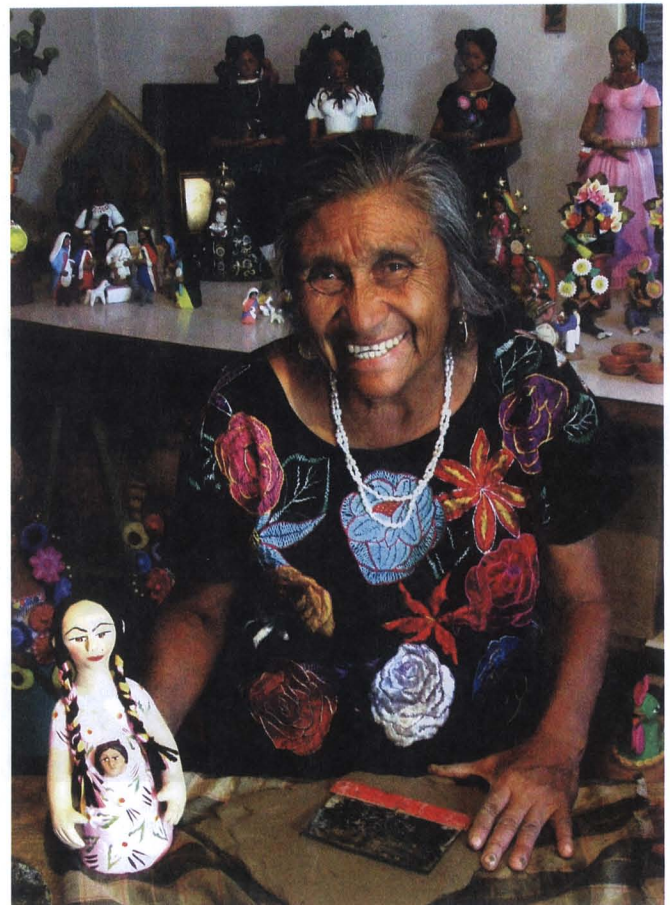
The Santa Fe International Folk Art Market is the world's largest, featuring fabulous music and food. Not only that, the estimated \$2 million in sales supports over 12,000 artists — who average \$16,000 in sales per booth and take home 90% of the profits. The market has helped them purchase land, build new studios, run health clinics, pay school fees and books, and buy farm animals that bring additional wealth to them. An estimated 20,000 people are directly helped through the sales, and more than half the profits are spread to new communities.

The celebration begins Thursday evening, July 9th, with a free concert in the plaza adjacent to Museum Hill, a preview of the art, as well as a gala benefit dinner for 500 people at 7 p.m. on Saturday. The full market opens at 9:00 a.m. It is definitely worth arriving.

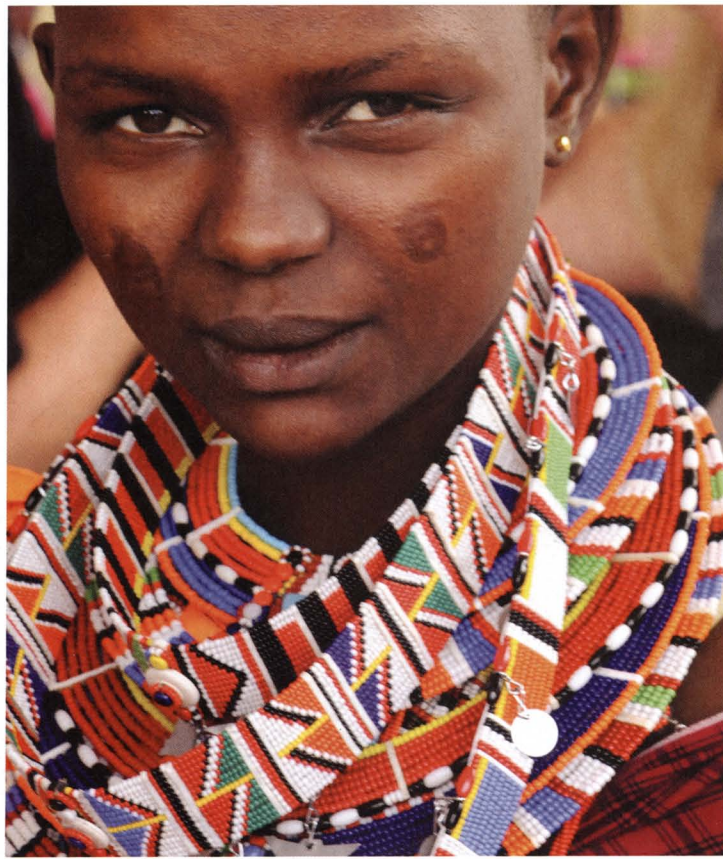
THE MARKET IS OPEN July 11 and 12 on Museum Hill in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Tickets go to folkartmarket.org.
